
Our children are always eager and excited to learn new things. They are very curious and have all kinds of questions about how things work and why things happen.




We hope the children enjoy with all the activities their teachers have planned for them and have fun as they discover new things.

Before Enrolling Your Child In TK

If your child is turning five between September 2nd and December 2nd of this year, you might be thinking about enrolling them in Transitional Kindergarten.

The TK ratio of adults to children can be as high as 25 to 1 teacher and an aide. That computes to a ratio of 1 adult to every 12.5 children. The TK ratio is higher than allowed by State Licensing and is higher than the recommended ratios of the National Association for the Education of Young Children and the National Head Start Association which advocates for a maximum ratio of 10 Children to 1 adult. The ideal ratio as recommended by the National Resource Center for Health and Safety in Child Care and Early Education is 8.5 children per adult.

The TK school day is usually 6.5 hours per day and doesn't address a parent who generally works an 8 hour day plus needs time for commuting. The public school year does not address the short days that most schools have weekly, the long breaks at various times during the school year or the entire summer.

Before you make a decision, think about the following:

- Is your child ready for a formal school experience at age four?
- Will your child be sitting for long periods of time at a desk?
- Will TK serve your needs if you are a working parent?
- What will you do when school is not in session: summers, holiday weeks, early dismissal days?
- Will there be opportunities for your child to learn through play?
- Will there be opportunities for your child to move around and experience activities in small groups and individual activities?
- How many children will there be in the classroom?

In the end, it is your decision to make according to your child's and your family's needs.
