### COVID-19

#### Meeting public health guidelines to keep families and staff safe

In the early days of the pandemic, regulatory agencies such as the LA County Public Health Department, the Community Care Licensing Division of the CA Department of Social Services and the Long Beach Health and Human Services Department issued multiple guidance and regulation documents giving us instructions and guidelines on how to re-open our centers to safely serve children and families.

We took all precautionary safety measures to protect our staff, children and families. All staff were required to take COVID-19 training on safety measures and basic information that was known at the time of the virus. All staff and children 2 years of age and older were required to wear face coverings. Sanitizing measures were increased to multiple times per day to clean and disinfect highly-touched surfaces. Everyone's temperature was taken upon entering the center and children were monitored throughout the day for fever. Children were kept in their own group and did not mix with other groups or teachers. No one with any respiratory symptoms was allowed to enter the

centers. Parents no longer enter the center to drop off their children. Staff escort children from the entrance door to their classroom.

Food service was changed from family-style eating to individually served meals. The kitchen staff prepared meals in individual to-go containers. Milk cartons substituted pitchers of milk.

We closed our centers on March 18 and re-opened May 4th to serve Essential Workers only; 66 children and 40 staff returned. In June, when things started opening once again, we brought back an additional 84 children for a total of 160 children currently being served. We are grateful that, to date, there have only been three positive COVID-19 cases, and those were from outside of our centers. The cleaning, sanitizing and safety protocols are working.

This pandemic has brought our staff together to work towards keeping children safe. Our board stepped in to provide leadership and guidance. The commitment and dedication of our staff and board has been evident. For this, we are grateful.



## Take Home Book Program

*Reading at home continues*

Our Take Home Book Program had to be revised to accommodate the new restrictions due to the pandemic. This program is a great way to share the joy of reading while children are at home. The program originally involved sending home book bags with books, reading prompt questions for parents, and a journal every week. But, to reduce the risk of spreading germs, we modified the program so children can still enjoy the books, parents can use the prompts, and share their journal entries on social media parent pages.

Teachers are now reading the books in the classroom with the children who are present. For children distance learning at home, teachers post the book title, author and illustrator and, if possible, a YouTube video link of the book being read on the individual centers' closed social media parent pages. Prompt question cards are also posted or the questions are typed out. The journals have been sent home for children to keep and parents are invited to share pictures or journal entries. We are grateful for the continued partnership with Bring me A Book Foundation and their dedicated staff, Dale Petrulis and Colleen Trisch.



## Long Beach Camerata Singers Music Program

*COVID-19 did not stop the music*



Early in the year, we planned to bring a wonderful music program with the Long Beach Camerata Singers (LBCS) to provide basic music instruction to our children. When the pandemic hit, we quickly converted the plan to a virtual program, piloting it at our Kohn Center first.

We held three workshops with 40 preschool children. Next we will offer it to our Grisham and North Pacific children. The program introduces vocabulary words such as melody, tone, and pitch. Mr. Joe used Row, Row, Row Your Boat as a theme for the workshops. A big-screen television with built-in camera and microphone was donated by LBCS for the Zoom lessons. At the end of the program, the LB Camerata Singers provided a performance for the children.

In the future, we will incorporate kazoos, shakers, and other musical instruments to augment the learning. The goal of this program is to provide music enrichment to children who may not have this opportunity. Also, it helps us enhance our teaching because it fits perfectly with our curriculum framework and the CA Learning Foundations.

In a follow up email, Mr. Joe reported, "Everything went so well, and without a hitch! It seems the technology we set up was very easy to use. The kids were quite responsive to the workshops and the accompanying performance."
